### La Nauve, Hôtel & Jardin

This four-kilometer/2.5-mile walking tour of the Boinaud vines brings to life a guiding ethos: "We respect the land where our vines grow and the healthier our soil, the more fertile it will be." A mobile app connects to 12 interactive terminals along the itinerary, which finishes in a tasting cellar amongst 41 alembics (stills).

# SELECTION OF COGNAC HOUSES

Many of today's major houses were established in the 18th and 19th centuries. Here are experiences to enjoy at seven of the most notable.

# Find Cognac and kings at Baron Otard & d'Ussé

### Cognac

The Château de Cognac is home of the Baron Otard & d'Ussé Cognac house. In 1795, noting that the thick 10th-century fortress walls would provide exceptional aging conditions for his eaux-de-vie, the eponymous baron purchased the Gothic and Renaissance structure, saving from total destruction the 15th-century birthplace of Francis I, one of France's greatest kings. Now a historic monument, the castle offers several tours that bring to life the histories of both France and Baron Otard & d'Ussé Cognac. Combine a visit to the king's apartments, usually closed to the public, with a discovery of the cellars' unique natural aging conditions. Or learn the art of tasting and serving Cognac using an exclusive blend of castle-aged eaux-de-vie. Try an unusual tasting: in the dark and blindfolded. Afterward, stop at Le Lys, the castle cocktail bar. Booking is recommended for all visits.

# Blend your own Cognac at Camus

### Cognac

Founded in 1863, Camus is the largest Cognac house to remain independent and familyowned. Traditions and practices have been passed down through five generations and rely on a proprietary, patented distillation method in small traditional pot stills that produce notable and intensely aromatic cognacs. Multiple bespoke tasting experiences explore the large selection of crus, vintages, and horizontals and verticals of Camus products, each also including a guided tour of the family house and behind-the-scenes introduction to the production of Cognac, from grape to glass. For an especially unforgettable experience, the Master Blender session sees the expert-led creation of a visitor's own XO Cognac that can be brought home in a personalized bottle to share with friends. Tours and workshop are available all year round by appointment.

# Meet true prestige at Courvoisier

### Jarnac

Courvoisier is one of the most celebrated major Cognac houses. Since its initial founding in 1796 and grounding in Jarnac in 1828, it has, among other things, been appreciated by Napoleon Bonaparte (with whose silhouette its bottles are marked), supplied Napoleon III's Imperial Court, played a leading role in the dinner that marked the opening of the Eiffel Tower and been honored (twice!) with the 'Prestige de la France,' the highest accolade for quality in France, the only Cognac house to hold such an award. Still today, Courvoisier exclusively uses a customized distilling process with small pot stills to ensure its complexity. The Premium tour steps into its imposing 19th-century castle to explore the soul and legacy of Courvoisier – including the Paradis cellar, the sanctuary of the most precious eaux-de-vie; a museum emphasizing Courvoisier's shared history with Napoleon – and concludes with a tasting. # Take a multi-sensory journey to « Planet Hennessy »

### Cognac

Since 1765, Hennessy, the world's leading Cognac house, has enjoyed international standing from its base on the banks of the Charente. Its visits offer a rich, multi-sensory learning experience, taking in the vineyards, historic cellars and some of the secrets behind its cognacs' time-honored craftsmanship. The most comprehensive tour is the three-hour Grape to Glass 360° prestige experience that includes glimpses of little-known corners of the estate before settling into the VIP salon at the Château de Bagnolet, the Hennessy family's historic home, for a comprehensive look at the art of Cognac production, a taste of five eaux-de-vie representing various stages in the aging process and a finish with three cognacs and selection of hors d'oeuvres. # Map your own multimedia journey at Martell

### Cognac

Founded in 1715, Martell is the oldest great Cognac houses, famed for its presence aboard the Orient Express and the Concorde, on polar expeditions and at royal weddings, among other things. These days, Martell invites visitors to map their own journeys of discovery. A multimedia format offers immersion into the house's heritage, terroir and savoir-faire. Different spaces travel visitors back in time and across continents to appreciate the range of artisanal skills that produce Martell cognacs. The journey culminates in a tasting with a house expert. Before leaving, visitors can stop at the Martell Foundation, a space devoted to artistic production and contemporary creation. On the top floor of the building is the Indigo by Martell bar, a vast roof terrace with an inventive cocktail menu and spectacular views. Also view the all-terrain electric scooter vineyard tours in the New in 2023 section.

# Lunch in a chai at Meukow

### Cognac

In 1862, two Silesian brothers set up a commercial office in Cognac after several trips to France in search of eaux-de-vie for Silesian royalty. Today, Meukow, still situated in the middle of Cognac and overseen by one of the very few female cellar masters in the Cognac world, is known for its suppleness, power and elegance. Once inside Meukow's imposing gateway, visitors are treated to a complete change of scene: a guided discovery tour of the house's history and savoir-faire, complete with modern visual effects in its distillery, cellars and more. At the end of the tour, visitors taste three cognacs, but can extend their experience into lunch at Chai Meukow, a refurbished cellar transformed into a restaurant. Cognacs can be enjoyed in this convivial setting as an aperitif, digestif or in Cognac-based food pairings with local specialities prepared by an on-site chef.

# View a sustainable future at Rémy Martin

### Cognac

Anchored in excellence since 1724, Rémy Martin is all about being exceptional, from special rights granted to it by King Louis XV to plant new vines (1738) and appointing the first woman cellar master to a major Cognac house (2003) to leading the push for sustainable agriculture and becoming the first wine-growing estate in the Charente region to obtain a «High Environmental Value» certification (2012). Rémy Martin has the biggest range of visitor experiences, which take guests from vineyard to distillery to final product and range across the work sites, the Domaine de Merpins and the firm's historic house. There are walking, electric bike and now electric Méhari (see the New in 2023 section) vineyard eco-tours with a focus on sustainability and biodiversity. For budding mixologists, the Cocktail Creation program measures, shakes, blends and pours Cognac cocktails. Reserve ahead for all experiences.

# Bertrand

### Réaux

In the heart of the Petite Fine Champagne growing region, and under its trademark Windmill of Bel'Air, the last one in Reaux, the Bertrand family has respected the traditional art of cultivating vines since 1731. Guided visits teach the essentials of Cognac and Pineau des Charentes production with accompanying tastings of both.

### Saint-Saturnin

The cognacs of the Bourgoin family estate are authentically handcrafted by the same people who work the vines, capturing their sincerity and boasting an excellent aromatic range. Visitors are shown around the vineyard and working areas, and then invited to a tasting.

Two-hour visits take in the atmospheric wharf-side buildings redecorated by British designer Russell Sage and conclude with multiple tastings.

# Frapin

### Segonzac

The Frapin family has been winegrowers since 1270 and distillers for 20 generations in the Grande Champagne region. A 2½-hour visit of their estate includes the vineyard, distillery, cellars and a museum. Halfway through, there's a cocktail break at Château Fontpinot and, at the end, a tasting of four cognacs.

### Champagne-Vigny

# **Bache-Gabrielsen**

### Cognac

Run by the same family for four generations, this Cognac house dates back to 1852. Its Cellar Master Challenge asks visitors to recompose a blend created by the Bache-Gabrielsen cellar master, Jean-Philippe Bergier. Along the way, participants discover Cognac's terroirs, aromas and tastes. Everyone leaves with a personal blend.

### Saintes

Launched in 1999, this independent family-run business gathers and ages casks of old Cognac, recording and telling their stories and terroirs on what's bottled. ### Claix

The Abecassis's collection of estates covers 370 hectares/915 acres of vines, making it one of the largest independent producers in Cognac. A full visit experience reveals the complete journey taken by a grape, from the vine to glass, and includes a master blender workshop with a take-home bottle of one's own Cognac.

Visitors can admire the entire Cognac and Pineau des Charentes production process right on its 90-hectare/222-acre property, also certified for its «High Environmental Value».

# **Frères Moine**

### Chassors

Since 1980, the Moine family has passionately worked its 40 hectares/100 acres of vineyards. Numerous hands-on visitor experiences give meaning to their viticultural lifestyle, from tasting workshops to an award-winning discovery of oak's critical role in Cognac production to a half-day "peasant getaway" of vineyard work during a harvest.

The Cognac tradition began in the 15th century, when the Dutch introduced distillation to preserve the quality of Charentes wines during transport. Three centuries later, the stills of Charente were redesigned, marking the arrival of double distillation. Then came the practice of aging the sought-after wine spirits in oak barrels, which helped improve its quality. However, the market for Cognac really developed in the 19th century, when many of the Cognac houses were established. Bottles then replaced oak barrels for shipments.

Officially delimited in 1909, the Cognac region today covers 83,140 hectares/205,443 acres of vineyards planted on the plains and gently rolling hills of central western France. Bordered by the Atlantic Ocean and crossed by the Charente River, Cognac has a famously conducive climate for grape growing: ideal temperature variations, a countryside bathed in a unique, warm sunlight and clay-limestone soils.

The 20th century also saw the formal introduction of Cognac regulations and, in 1936, the creation of the region's "Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée" or AOC (today's protected designation of origin, or PDO), its vineyards divided between six crus (growing areas), all planted primarily with three white grape varieties renowned for their aromatic complexity: Ugni Blanc (more than 98% of the plants), Colombard and Folle Blanche.

Today, Cognac is home to a living heritage that both shapes and is shaped by the land. From winegrowers to cellar masters, and distillers to coopers and boilermakers, Cognac expertise has been passed from one generation to the next, each aiming to preserve it and develop it in the quest for even greater quality.

# MIXOLOGY & COCKTAIL BARS

In addition to the exceptional IGP Charentais wines are two AOC alcohols (Cognac and Pineau des Charentes) that we feature in this section. Local bars and their mixologists expertly blend and play with these unique regional drinks to whet one's whistle. Below are a handful of top-notch cocktail bars that do just that.

# Exceptional regional drinks



# Cognac

Cognac is a subtle blend of eaux-de-vie of different ages and profiles that produce an ambercolored elixir of floral, fruity and oaky aromas. It can be enjoyed on its own, but 80% of Cognac is consumed in cocktails. Cognac was granted AOC status in 1936 and must be produced according to precise practices and specifications – double distilled in copper pot stills and aged for at least two years in special oak barrels – guaranteeing its origin and authenticity. Cognacs are classified as VS («Very Special»), VSOP («Very Superior Old Pale»), Napoléon, XO («Extra Old»), XXO («Extra Extra Old») and Hors d'âge, denoting blends from eaux-de-vie aged for different lengths of time, from the minimum two years to 14 years or older.

# **Pineau des Charentes**

Pineau des Charentes is an aromatic fortified wine (white, red and rosé) made from blending grape must (juice) and Cognac. It is drunk as an apéritif and used in recipes. The grape must and Cognac always come from the same vineyard on the same estate and are made by the same people. After harvested grapes are pressed, Cognac from the previous year is added and the mixture stored in oak barrels for a long time to gain a distinctive taste. The Pineau des Charentes was awarded AOC status in 1945.

# **Charentais wines**

Given the region's mild and sunny climate, the same vines used for the production of Cognac and Pineau are also used for wines. Dry, light whites account for more than 80% of production, with a growing number of fresh and fruity reds and rosés. Charentais wines are usually drunk young, but reveal a fuller complexity after a period of aging. In 2009, Charentais wines were certified as IGP (formerly "vins de table").

# GASTRONOMY

Flavors and local gastronomic products – from the land and the sea – are big business in the Charentes region. Not to be missed are three AOP foods (Charentes-Poitou butter, potatoes of Ile de Ré and Chabichou du Poitou cheese). Showcasing these products are the Charentes' eight restaurants featured below. They are a celebrated fraction of more than one thousand excellent eating establishments found throughout the region. Learn more about them and other notable produce.

# Local culinary specialties



# Salt

Ile de Ré is world famous for its fleur de sel, a delicate, flaky and mild salt that forms as a thin crystalized layer on the surface of shallow seawater pools. It is harvested from saltworks in a traditional, labor-intensive process of raking the purest and whitest layer off the top.

# Cheese

The region has several notable local cheeses: Chabichou du Poitou (AOP; a goat cheese with a wrinkled rind and creamy interior), Mothais sur feuille (a goat cheese wrapped in a leaf), Manslois (smooth texture and creamy flavor), Jonchée (wrapped in natural rush and most often flavored with almond) and Taupinette (a goat cheese with subtle hazelnut and forest floor notes).

# Potatoes

The potatoes of Ile de Ré (AOP) have a soft, slightly sweet flesh and delicate skin that rubs off easily. It is only grown by 35 farmers who work 60 hectares/150 acres from a total of 360/900 in rotation. To preserve their special characteristics, Ile de Ré potatoes are harvested before July 31st.

# Melons

The pale orange flesh of Charentais melons has a sweet flavor with a soft, floral aftertaste. Also known as French cantaloupes, Charentais melons are eaten fresh and usually locally since they don't travel well.

# Oysters

Marennes-Oléron oysters (IGP) are celebrated for their taste. Matured or raised in the claires (shallow salt-water ponds, often former salt pans) of Europe's largest oyster-farming center, they are the only oyster in France with a «Label Rouge» certification (a food quality assurance label).

# Butter

Charentes-Poitou butter is the oldest butter with PDO status. Using milk only from cows raised in the region and fabricated according to traditional methods and precise specifications, it is beloved for its smooth, creamy texture and hazelnut taste. The region is also known for its beurre salé (salted butter).

# Truffles

Many Périgord black truffle patches have been developed in Charente. Open to all, the Jarnac truffle market showcases expert-certified, quality truffles everyxTuesday from December to February. The market opens officially to the sound of horns – a unique (and fragrant) experience.

# Chicken

The Barbezieux chicken is the biggest and the strongest of all French chicken breeds and said to be one of the best-tasting meat chickens in the world, particularly ideal for roasting.

# Cycling

One of the most popular activities in Cognac is cycling – a family activity for which Charentes is ideally suited with 6,750 km/4,250 miles of bicycle paths, including five European and national cycling tracks.

# La Flow Vélo®

For independent travelers, this national trail crosses the Charentes from Ile d'Aix to the Dordogne's Thiviers. Since 2023 the path has been extended 37 miles to Le Lardin Saint Lazare near Lascaux, and will soon reach Sarlat. The trail is now 350 km/close to 218 miles of gentle riding that visits Rochefort, Saintes, the archeological site of Angeac-Charente, Cognac, Angoulême to a very scenic section of the Dordogne.

### DAY 2 In Archiac, Jarnac-Champagne, Pons & Saintes

- Morning Head to Archiac (10 minutes) for a visit to the Maison de la Vigne et des Saveurs (vine museum; see the Natural, Sensory & Slow Tourism section) to learn about the world of Cognac. The history of its vineyards, vintages and grape varietals; the Cognac production cycle and who is involved (the professions of the vineyard and the cooperage); and the process of creating Pineau and Cognac.
- Lunch Le Relais de Jarnac (Jarnac-Champagne)
- Afternoon Travel 10 minutes to Jarnac-Champagne and its Château Montifaud Cognac house. Tour behind the scenes to discover its secrets and treasures, and for an exclusive glimpse at the cellar master's job.
- Late Continue your journey for 13 minutes to Pons for Afternoon a stop at the Pilgrimage Hospital, one of five UNESCO World Heritage Sites in the area and the only surviving structure of its kind along the medieval Camino de Santiago. Carry on to Saintes.

### DAY 4 In La Rochelle

Lunch Discover the unique 2-star Michelin, ocean-view restaurant of Christopher Coutanceau (see the Restaurants section). Afternoon Explore La Rochelle on a guided tour by foot or by bike. Climb one of its towers - famous vestiges of the medieval maritime fortifications - and admire the magnificent views of Fort Boyard, the old marina and the islands. Board a guided cruise boat for a breath of sea air. Dinner Les Quatre Sergents, an authentic winter garden just a stone's throw from the port Night Boat shuttle back to Boyardville in Oléron or stay the night in La Rochelle.

## DAY 3 On Oléron Island

Morning	Drive to Oléron Island, the largest French island on the Atlantic coast, 65 minutes away. Take a break at the century-old oyster-farming village of Fort-Royer to view the local product.
